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1.0 Introduction and Background Information

The States of Guernsey through The Ellen Jane Rihoy Trust provided support to Chiuzira Education and Development Centre in 2008 and 2010 to construct classrooms for Chiuzira Primary School. The project managed to construct 8 classrooms, one community hall, a teacher's office and four pupils' toilets. The enrollment of Chiuzira Primary School at that time was below 500. Between 2004 and December 2011, the school was managed by a Committee and Trustees with support from a local Malawian individual. The individual was responsible for paying Teachers' salaries and wages for administration and support staff. Considering sustainability issues, in January 2012, Chiuzira Primary School was officially handed over to the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology to run and manage it. With this move, everything changed at Chiuzira Primary School. The number of teachers increased from 6 to 56. The enrollment of children has jumped from 360 to 3700 as at 31st December 2015. This sudden increase in enrollment has brought another level of challenge- high demand for classroom space. Very few pupils learn under proper classrooms. At the moment, the rest of the pupils learn under trees; four classes share the community hall; in church building close to the school and in the open sun. To deal with this problem, the school administration built two additional classrooms in 2014 with support from the community and parents. However, this was a drop in the ocean.

In November 2015, Traditional leaders, School Administration, School Committee and Parent Teacher Association met to discuss the way forward. They agreed that there was need to extend the classrooms from the then 10 to 22 (additional 12). Land for this expansion was allocated by the Traditional Leaders.

In response to this shortage of classrooms at Chiuzira Primary School, The Ellen Jane Rihoy Trust (EJRT) provided support of $\pounds 10,000.00$ to Chiuzira Education and Development Centre (CEDC) of the extension of classrooms at the end of February 2016. With this funding, CEDC achieved to construct four classrooms and two toilets with the funding.

In 2017, CEDC received additional funding of £40,000.00 from the States of Guernsey to construct six classrooms, 8 toilets and procure some desks for pupils. It pleasing to report that by the end of April 2018, all the six classrooms and toilets had been completed. On 27^{th} April, 2018, a ceremony was organized to mark the official opening of the additional infrastructure. The pupils' desks were still under production due to challenges in electricity power outages. This report provides a detailed account of how the £40,000.00 was used. The final report provided here is the last disbursement of £20,000.00 which was received in December 2017.

2.0 Activities Achieved

We achieved to construct three classroom blocks with two classrooms each, eight toilets and procured 120 desks.

2.1 Classrooms

A total of six classrooms were constructed. There are now a total of 22 classrooms, originally 10. This increase in classroom space has meant that pupils can now learn under proper shelter rather than under the sun and sometimes break away from lessons due to rains.

2.2. Toilets

A total of eight toilets were constructed for use by pupils. There are now a total 22 toilets, ten for boys and ten for girls, two for teaching staff.



Two toilet blocks of four toilets each were constructed, one for boys and another for girls.

2.3 Desks

A total of 120 desks were bought. However, these were delivered very late at the end of October 2018 due to constant electricity blackouts in Malawi according to the contractor. Only the senior classes (standard 8) have been provided with the desks.



3.0 Financial Report

3.1 Income and Expenditure (British Pound Account)

Financially, we received a total of £40,000.00. The first tranche of £20,000.00 was already reported in November 2017. The second and last tranche £20,000.00 was received from the Ellen Jane Rihoy Trust on 1^{st} December 2017. The account carried forward £48.17 from November 2017. The bank gave a credit interest of £22.65. Therefore, total income in the British Pound Account was £20,070.50.

On expenditure, project spent a total of $\pounds 20,055.32$ on various activities. The Bank charged monthly service fees totaling $\pounds 3.85.00$. The also charged Withholding tax of $\pounds 4.53$ on the credit interest of $\pounds 22.65$ that was generated. The total expenditure in the British Pound Account is therefore, $\pounds 20,063.70.00$. This is presented in Table 1.0 below.

3.2 Income and Expenditure (Malawi Kwacha Account)

A total $\pounds 20,055.00$ was exchanged at an average exchange of rate Malawi Kwacha K979.7294 to $\pounds 1.00$ which yielded an equivalent of MK19, 648,473.74. Out of this, a total of MK19, 648,070.42 equivalent of $\pounds 20,054.58$ was spent on builders, building materials, and transport hire, women drawing water, supervision costs and bank service fees. 3.3 Description of Expenditures Details

Bank Services Fees: Monthly bank charges on bank accounts

Building materials: These include bricks, bags of cement, quarry stones, planks, timber poles for scaffolding, iron sheets, wire nails, iron sheets nails, iron sheet valleys, door frames, doors, window cement blocks, locks, wires, and various electrical items.

Transport costs: These include hiring of vehicles to collect and ferry bricks, sand, and the various building materials bought from town. This also includes fuel for supervising the construction, running costs going to banks and shops to get quotations and make purchases.

General Labourer Costs: These included costs for laborers hired to work on various manual activities during the construction period.

Water Drawing Costs: These costs were incurred to pay women drawing water from wells over one kilometer away from the construction site. There has been no running water at Chiuzira from piped water due to low water levels from the Malingunde Dam, the water source of the Lilongwe Water Board water.

Desks: This cost was incurred to procure desks for pupils. The production of the desks delayed quite a lot due to slow production as a result of continuous electricity black outs in Malawi. The last delivery was made at the end of November 2018.

4.0 Challenges

The construction encountered some delays due to a number of factors. The production of pupil's desks encountered problems of electricity, Continued black outs delayed the production of the desks metal frameworks. The desks were completed in late October 2018.

5.0 Conclusion

CEDC Committee and Trustees, the School Committee, the Parent and Teacher Association (PTA) and the entire Chiuzira community are thankful to the Guensery Overseas Aid Organization, the Ellen Jane Rihoy Trust, the Dr. Keith Lloyd and all those took part to ensure the successful completion of this project.
